1. Objectives

The report gives a summary of findings of the survey on the non-academic background of new full-time local undergraduate students admitted by Lingnan University in the year 2019/20. The findings may facilitate the planning of student services and facilities. The data will also be useful to academic staff and other interested parties in knowing more about our newly-admitted students.

2. Methodology

The survey was conducted from Aug to Nov 2019. Questionnaires were sent to all new full-time local undergraduate students via emails and questionnaires in paper format are also available in SSC counter. Participation was entirely voluntary.
